The Cargo and People on *The Greater First FO*-CUS Train of Hope and Freedom are representatives of events, stories, and experiences that serve as a refreshing historical resource of information. inspiration and instruction that will invigorate us for the trip that lies ahead in 2014! During the second half of 2013 these Cargo and People have accumulated as this train of Hope and Freedom has stopped at stations along her climbing travel route. And now, finally, you are holding in your hands the 2013 Final Edition and it is packed with the significant substantive treasure!

At THE JULY STATION, we find that this edition's fiber and fabric is made of the energy, effort, blood, sweat, tears and ultimate sacrifices. General George Washington served at the highest rank of General of the Armies. Under his leadership, our country's troops fought in the American Revolutionary War that started on April 19, 1775 and lasted until September 3, 1783. This war was waged to gain independence from Great Britain. By June of 1776 the Americans were in full control of every state, but the British continued to fight. Then on July 4, 1776, the Continental Congress signed The Declaration of Independence. July 4, 2013 was the 237th Anniversary of Independence Day celebrating our nation's independence from Great Britain. We commemorated and honored the 60th Anniversary of the Armistice of the Korean War on July 27, 1953.

On July 13, 2013 our congregation's oldest member, Brother Ira Tinsley, turned 101 years old!

Now we're rolling into **THE AUGUST STA-TION!** In August, it was the 50th Anniversary of the Civil Rights "March on Washington" for Jobs and Freedom that occurred on August 28, 1963. And we also witnessed the August 16, 2013 release of the movie "Lee Daniels' The Butler" which is the story of the late Trustee Eugene Allen. He was an active member at The Greater First Baptist Church for 59 years and served as a Trustee and an usher with our Senior Ushers Ministry. Brother Allen was a butler at The

White House during eight presidential

administrations. The movie is based on the book by Washington Post writer Will Haygood. It is true that in his life of service Brother Eugene Allen opened doors not just for presidents, potentates and world leaders, but he also opened them for us. Greater First Baptist had our transportation vehicles packed for the occasion.

The 116th Annual Session of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention convened in Washington, D.C. on August 12-16, 2013 at the Marriott Hotel. The Lott Carey movement was founded in 1897 by African American Baptists who were committed to a substantial foreign mission thrust—especially on the continent of Africa. The convention bears the name of the Rev. Lott Carey who was one of the first American and Baptist missionaries to West Africa. He was born enslaved in 1780 in Charles City County, Virginia. Lott Carey purchased his own freedom in 1813. He led a pioneering missionary team to Liberia in 1821 that engaged in evangelism, education, and health care. The Greater First Baptist Church was well represented by 14 delegates at

116th Annual Session. Among them were the leaders of our missionary ministries: Sister Gladys Baskett, President of Eliza Smallwood Missionary Ministry, Deaconess Lisa Felder, President of the Warriors for Christ Junior Missionary Ministry and Deaconess-in-Training Minnie Gardner and Sister Christine Powell, GFBC Sunday School Missionaries.

Customarily our attention and activities go through a shift in the summer. We move from Reading, Writing and Arithmetic to Recreation, Relaxation and Retreating, Playing, vacationing etc. Or some just go to plain ol' loafing. But with everything that has been said above, we must make sure that we make the most of this time. It really represents a period of significance as we go through this transitional period. It is a proven fact that during the summer break from school most students will lose at least a percentage of what they learned during the school year. At the July and August stations we hear this sage advice: "Don't lose what you learned; Don't give away pearls to swine; Don't waste what was earned by great sacrifice."

As we travel along the railways, we are transitioning from the days of summer into the fall season. Looking out of the window we can see that God the Heavenly Arborist and the Ultimate Artist in nature is painting the trees with brilliant colors of auburn, brown, yellow and red. The winds are blowing and the leaves are falling. In the air there is a sense that says we are returning from our activities and attention of summer to the business of learning and labor. And here we are...We have arrived at THE SEPTEMBER STATION! School is back in session and we have a nice number of young people that are attending college in their very first semester: Asia James and Khadijah McDowell (Pennsylvania State University), Terrence Parks (University of West Virginia), and Dejanae Wright (Morgan State University). Each one of these 4 students was among the total group of all those students receiving scholarships from the GFBC Scholarship Ministry where Trustee Karen Freeman serves as President. Through the generosity of The Greater First Baptist Church and friends, the total group of students this year received approximately \$13,000 in scholarship support! Praise God and thanks to the givers for the financial support. This is an exciting time and it is full of great expectations!

During the week of Labor Day, September 2-6, 2013, The National Baptist Convention (NBC), USA, Incorporated held its Annual Session in Charlotte, NC. It is the largest predominantly African American Christian denomination in the U.S. and the second largest Baptist denomination in the world. There were well over 14,000 registered delegates there from across the United States. Reverend Dr. Winston C. and First Lady Bonita L. Ridley were there among them. First Lady Ridley serves as the National Coordinator/ Chair of the Minister's Wives and Widows of the Woman's Auxiliary of NBC, USA. This year's session was hosted by "The Carolinas" both North and South Carolina. The host church and pastor were The Friendship Baptist Church of Charlotte, NC and the Reverend Dr. Clifford Jones. Our National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. President, Dr. Julius R. Scruggs of Huntsville, Alabama, at his annual presidential address announced that he will not be seeking reelection for a second term. That announcement set in motion a flurry of activity concerning electing a new president for our Convention.

Presently, there are six men seeking to be elected to the office of President NBC, USA at the Annual Session in 2014. They are: Dr. Boise Kimber, Conn., Dr. Alvin Love, Ill., Dr. Clifford Jones, NC, Dr. R. B. Holmes, FL, Dr. Randy Vaughn, TX and Dr. Jerry Young, MS. During the Board of Directors meeting at this Session, it was voted and announced that next year's 2014 Annual Session will be held in New Orleans, LA, September 1-5, 2014. Since Labor Day is Monday, September 1, 2014 that means the 2014 Annual Session will not start the week after the first Sunday of the month of September. Thus, it will convene on the week leading up to the first Sunday. Only those Delegates that were registered in the 2013 Annual Session in Charlotte, NC will be eligible to vote in 2014 NBC, USA, Inc. Presidential election in New Orleans, LA! I hear the Train

The Lott Carey Convention

The 116th annual session of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention was held August 12-16, 2013 at the Marriott Wardman Park Hotel in Washington, DC. We were blessed to have fourteen members of the Greater First Baptist Church attending the session representing the Youth, Missionary, Outreach, Hospitality and Sunday School Ministries. The fourteen members were: Gladys Baskett, Delores Couser, Lisa Felder, Patricia Fitcheard, Minnie Gardner, Sarah Graves, Gloria James, Jean Johnson, Willie Mae Osborn, Dorothy Pratt, Elizabeth Queen, Marion Washington, Ella Williams, Nicholas Felder and Jasmine McGill.

The theme for the convention was "Places we have to go" taken from John 4:4, which supported the overall mandate of the Convention of helping churches extend their Christian witness to the ends of the earth by sending people into

God's world, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to touch lives with the transforming love of Jesus Christ.

The Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Society, was founded in 1897 at Shiloh Baptist Church in Washington, DC and named for Rev. Lott Carey (1780-1829), who was born a slave in Charles County, VA and purchased his freedom in 1813. Rev. Carey led a pioneering missionary team from Norfolk, VA to the West Coast of Africa in 1821. The convention partners with all churches, missionary groups and individuals who endorse the purpose of the convention and is financed through donations and memberships. The funds are used to provide financial, technical, educational and health support to indigenous communities around the world.

For some of us, if not all, it was our first time going to the convention and we did not know exactly what to expect, but we were all excited to be there. The number of youth and churches represented from New York to South Carolina was impressive and we were glad to be in the count.

Our first day started out a little confusing. We were going into a class without a text book and we did not know the topic of discussion and due to the number of people registered for the convention, our group of fourteen was separated into a much smaller group.

The topic for all of the classes was contextual Bible Study – Gender Based Violence. The reference for the topic was II Samuel 13:1-22 KJV, "The Rape of Tamar." This topic was also the springboard for the messages on human trafficking delivered by a number of the women speaking at the worship services. Some of the women were from African countries where they had been victimized by this act. They are now working with the Lott Carey organization in an effort to save other victims. We soon learned that this crime is very much alive in various countries, including the United States.

On Thursday night, we were moved by the message from Pastor Gregory K. Moss, Sr. of St. Paul Baptist Church, Charlotte NC, who is also the

Protocol

BASIC PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The use of parliamentary procedure is not just for secular organizations, but should be used by the church as well. Churches, on average, hold several official meetings throughout the year, and ministries hold monthly meetings. These meetings should be conducted in an official manner following a recognized, established procedure. By doing this meetings can be shortened (because everything is done in order) and can be more efficient and effective.

The President or chief officer of an organized society normally presides at its meetings and is then addressed as "Mr. President" or "Madam President". A person presiding at a meeting who has no regular title or whose position is temporary is addressed as "Mr. or Madam Chairman." Even in a small meeting, the presiding officer should not be addressed or referred to by name. Unless it is a committee meeting or a small board meeting, a member never speaks while seated, and a member does not speak without first having obtained the floor. The presiding officer speaks of himself or herself only in the third person—the personal pronoun "I" is not used. He or she refers to themselves as "the chair".

AGENDA

An agenda is usually prepared by the presiding officer and a copy is given to each member attending the meeting. The agenda states the items to be discussed at the meeting and who will present the information.

CALL TO ORDER

When the starting time of a meeting has arrived, the presiding officer (PO) calls the meeting to order. The officer waits or signals for quiet, and announces in a clear voice, "The meeting will come to order." The call to order is followed by opening ceremonies that consist of prayer, scripture, and song.

The first order of business is usually the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting.

READING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES


The chair says, "The Secretary will read the minutes." A formal motion to approve the minutes is not necessary, although such a motion is not out of order. However, it is time consuming. After the minutes have been read, the chair asks, "Are there any corrections to the minutes?" and pauses. If there are no corrections, the chair states 'There being no corrections to the minutes, the minutes are approved as read." If there are corrections, they are usually handled by unanimous consent. After any proposed corrections have been disposed of, the chair asks, "Are there further corrections?" and pauses. The chair then states, "The minutes are approved as corrected." The approved minutes then become the official proceedings of the Ministry.

TREASURER'S REPORT

At each meeting, the chair may ask for a "Treasurer's Report". This report may consist simply of a statement of the cash balance on hand, or it may include receipts, disbursements and balance on hand. Such a report requires NO ACTION by the ministry. The chair may ask if there are any questions. Members may ask questions about the report. The questions are directed to the chair. If the chair cannot or does not wish to answer, the chair will ask the treasurer to respond. In a larger assembly, after the report is given and questions have been answered, the chair simply says "The report will be filed for audit." It is not adopted by the assembly.

In the next issue, obtaining the floor and the necessary contents of the minutes will be discussed.

Reference: Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 11th Edition. This edition has been written with the church in mind, such as having a religious opening as opposed to a patriotic one and using the word "Ministry."

IPM ~Intercessors Praying Mightily

In December of 2012. Sister Lisa Turner met with our pastor, Rev. Dr. Winston C. Ridley, Jr. to discuss a vision the Lord gave her to start a prayer ministry at our church and the benefits that would come from it. Pastor was in agreement with what she shared as it was in line with the overall vision the Lord has given him for our church. The Dream Lives on at Greater First Baptist Church

In addition to legendary church usher and trustee Eugene Allen, who inspired the movie *Lee Dan*iels' The Butler, the Greater First Baptist Church can count several other members among this country's Civil Rights icons. These bold and courageous members integrated lunch counters and department stores; tested on behalf of the NAACP a desegregation ruling for interstate railroad travel; served as pioneers at major industries and schools; and broke barriers in both the local and federal government. These feats became especially noteworthy during the year 2013 with a groundbreaking reelection and celebrations of several historical landmark anniversaries. With the 50th Anniversary of the March on Washington imminent, the FOCUS newsletter and the Creative Arts Ministry seized the opportunity to highlight the remarkable history of its members.

Two youth volunteers, Barclay Gonzalez and Maurice Olden assisted the ministries by interviewing members who were willing to share their

story regarding the '63 March. As the two focused interviewers thoughtfully interacted with the marchers, they were com-



pleting an important task—recording history to share with others and include in the church's archives. A brief sampling of these interviews follows:

Dr. Clivious Johnson, who had earlier served in a public health tent during the Poor People's March, joined hundreds of his Omega Psi Phi fraternity brothers as they marched down Thirteenth Street.

Sister Janice Queen, who was in awe of the massive crowd, stated that all of the noise ceased with the exception of birds singing in the trees as Dr. King stepped up to speak.

Brother James L. Beatty, Sr., who felt so proud

as he marched with several of his coworkers, met up with the Alabama delegation who seemed like family as they shared stories and some of their home cooked food.



Deacon John Richardson, who had grown up in the segregated South, said that he had no hesitation about participating in the March.

Brother Johnny Routt, whose mother took him to the March, recalled the feel of unity as all races held hands during King's speech.

Deacon Eugene Scates, who was very young and reflective at the time, remarked how he marched in support of the Dream and hope for the future.

Sister Irma Salley, who marched with her younger sister, vividly remembered the Tuesday night prayer meeting, the walk to the Reflecting Pool, people of all races and stirring speeches.

Evelyn Rodgers-Washington, whose family helped integrate lunch counters and two department stores in Richmond, VA, marched with great conviction fifty years ago.

Brother William Washington, whose family has deep historical roots in the church, spoke of his commitment to the Dream as he marched among the rising generation seeking equality and freedom everywhere.

Trustee Emeritus Grady Humphrey, who was the first to integrate an agricultural and research center in Greenbelt, MD, marched with hope for the future.

Even though most of the interviewees indicated

that instead of publicly marching this ylear, they would celebrate in more personal ways, one interviewee shared her strong intent to march again. Sister Evelyn Rodgers-Washington marched on both days: Saturday, August 24, 2013 and the following "Let Freedom Ring" Wednesday, August 28, 2013. Afterward, she would have a moving update for the youth interviewers and a great intergenerational exchange with the youth who participated as a group from the church.

As the year comes to an end, Greater First Baptist Church can reflect upon the remarkable year 2013. In addition to displays featuring "The March" and "Lee Daniels' The Butler," the church has attempted to capture history visually through exhibits of members' personal collections; vintage and new photos and magazine clippings; student reports; and old newspapers, rare books and artifacts.

Undoubtedly, more members of Greater First will step forward and share in the coming year as civil rights and equality become focal themes for 2014.

eware of phone scams from people who claim they are calling on behalf of Microsoft or some other high-profile information technology (IT) company. These companies **charge** customers for information and they **NEVER** voluntarily call the customer, unless they are following up on a call you previously made to them.

How the scam works is they will tell you that there has been some sort of security breach or breakdown and they want to check if your computer has been affected. You will be asked to turn on your computer and they will walk you through the steps to get your IP address.

Every computer that communicates over the Internet is assigned an **IP** (**Internet Protocol**) address that uniquely identifies the device and distinguishes it from other computers on the Internet. For your home computers, IP addresses are assigned by your ISP (internet service provider), such as Verizon or Comcast.

NEVER give this information to someone you do not trust. Once your IP address falls into the hands of unsavory people, they can take over your computer and obtain all of your confidential information stored on it, such as your social security number, banking and credit card information, etc. The goal of these scammers is to access your bank accounts or to steal your identity. When you receive these types of calls, HANG UP or report them to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) at www.ftc.gov or call 1-877-FTC-HELP. You can also contact the Identity Theft Resource Center at 888-400-5530 for assistance if you have been a victim of phone fraud.

The Computer Ministry
